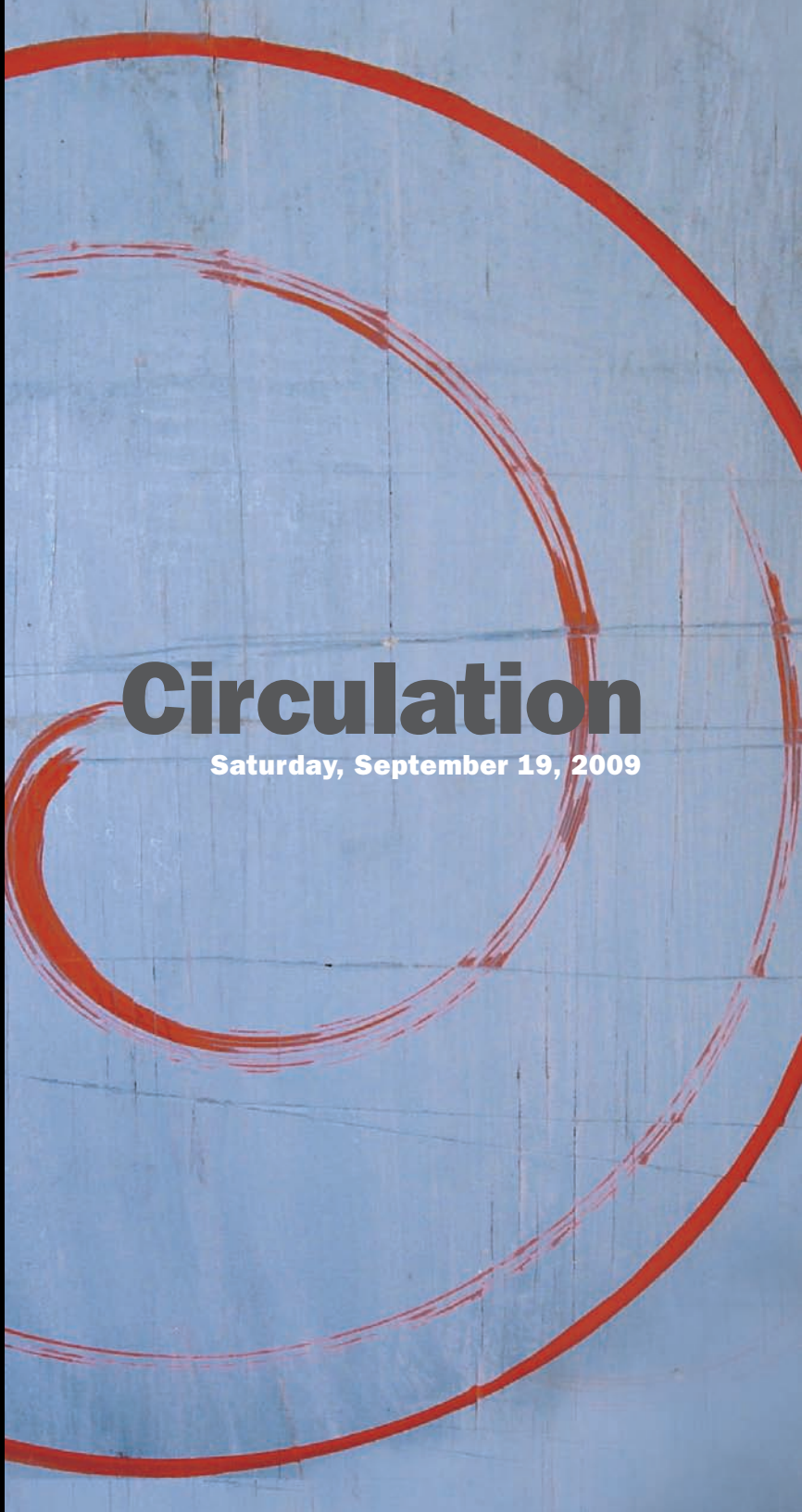

General Event Information

Take Care Around the Art Installations

Please be careful around the art installations and if you have children, watch them closely. There are pieces that utilize ceramics, glass and other fragile materials and some are positioned or suspended sensitively. In particular, if you are on one of the boats, please use special care when approaching the installations so as not to damage them. It's best to keep a safe distance away. (Note: this year we may not have boats available on the pond.)

Quiet During Music Performances

Please be courteous during the music performances so as not to make noises that could disturb the musicians or other members of the audience. Please turn off all beepers and cell phones. If you have small children, please consider bringing them to the children's area during the performances. If you arrive late, please wait outside the seating area until the piece being performed has ended before taking your seat. We take our music seriously at I-Park.

Evening Dinner

We are providing pizza (meat, vegetarian, cheese), salads, breads and deserts to those who have signed up for dinner on our RSVP form. We'll check you off at the welcome table when you arrive and give you a wristband to use later in the day. If you did not sign up for dinner in advance, please see Joanne when you arrive the day of the event. The pizza truck may be able to accommodate some of those who did not sign-up in advance on a cash-only basis, but we'll need to know who you are as early in the day as possible so we can plan accordingly.

Announcement of Activities

A bell, gong, siren or horn will sound 5 minutes before the start of each music performance. The siren will sound when dinner is ready at the truck.

Constructing/Launching Luminarias

If you are interested in helping build and/or launch one of the floating luminarias, please go to the designated area during the break we'll be taking out by the pond at the mid-point in the trail walk. We expect to have a table set-up with materials for such.

Walking the Trails

Be very careful when walking on the trails. Some have only recently been created and, unavoidably, there are stumps, roots, rocks and occasional holes along the way, sometimes obscured by leaves. The Thanatopolis area has many such obstructions. Also, be especially careful on the boardwalks if they're wet or covered with leaves – they can be very slippery. Please follow the trail markings and do not go on trails marked as closed. The map will help guide you, if you choose a self-directed tour.

Ticks

The land, typical of the region, is home to ticks, some of which carry Lyme and other diseases. You are welcome to spray yourself with Deep Woods Off or Jungle

Juice before heading out for the walk. You should check yourself when you return home for any evidence of a tick bite. If you have been bitten, watch for the typical Lyme disease symptoms and, should they develop, get yourself to a doctor for a Lyme disease test. Of course in many cases, symptoms can develop without signs of a bite. Please take care.

Toilets

There is a toilet in the Common Area and 2 portable toilets on the grounds near the Pond Studio (see map).

Pick-ups and Drop-offs at New Haven Train Station

Please contact us via e-mail at ipark@ureach.com or telephone at (860) 873-2468 if you would like to reserve a ride to and/or from either the New Haven or Old Saybrook train stations to I-Park on the day of the event. If you do not reserve a ride, we cannot guarantee that we can help you. But maybe another guest is heading in that direction and we can post a request on our bulletin board. If you'd like a ride, we'll send you a memo with instructions.

Late Arrivals

Ideally you will arrive by 2:00. However, if you arrive by 3:00, it's no big deal. After 3:00, however, all activities will shift to the trails and events out by the pond. Should you arrive after 3:00, we will have instructions posted in front of the Common Area (white barn). If there is no one in the vicinity, we will essentially make provision for you to call us so that you can be directed to where things are happening – or we'll come back and get you.

Handicapped Access

Some parts of the trail are handicap accessible, but other parts are clearly not. However, we should have the capacity to get you to locations where there are interesting activities taking place. Please call the office in advance so we can make preparations to greet you and provide assistance.

Parking

We will have 2 or 3 mowed fields available for parking. Please follow the signs and instructions and park in an organized way. We cannot allow parking on the street or on the lawn.

Rain Date/Cancellations

Yes, we have no rain date. We'll be there rain or shine. And unless there's a severe storm, most all our activities will proceed. We have a very large, heated tent out by the pond (our dinner tent) that we'll use as needed. Just dress accordingly. However, if you decide not to attend even though you've RSVP'd, we'd really appreciate it if you'd drop us an e-mail as soon as you decide that so we can adjust our planning accordingly (ipark@ureach.com).

No Pets

Please do not bring your pet to I-Park. It's not that kind of park. For several reasons, we do not allow pets on the land.
